

Aims and Scope

Information Security Technical Report is a quarterly technical report, focused on a specific topic. It is aimed at senior information security managers, who need to gain a better understanding of current information security issues and solutions, and provides guidance from professional researchers and practitioners. The main objective of the report is to provide a balanced, impartial, up to date, and authoritative view of specific topics within the information security arena. The report is a joint venture between Elsevier and the Information Security Group at Royal Holloway, University of London.

Topics for 2004

1. February — Identity Management
2. May — Web Services and XML
3. August — Malware – protection and recovery
4. November — Mobile security

Guide for authors

The *Information Security Technical Report* editorial board commissions articles on these topics. Unsolicited submissions can be considered. However, prospective authors are requested to pitch at a practitioner level, and are strongly advised that unsolicited submissions are rarely published. Please send an executive summary rather than a full paper.

The usual size of an article is 3,000 to 5,000 words. All contributions should be in English and, since the readership of the journal is international, authors are reminded that simple, concise sentences are our preferred style.

All technical terms which may be unknown to the readers should be clearly explained. Copyright is retained by the publisher, Elsevier Ltd, and the submission of a paper implies that it is not being considered for publication elsewhere.

Please ensure that the article contains all the authors' names, affiliations, and their full mailing addresses. These should be followed by a brief abstract and a list of five to 10 keywords.

Papers should be submitted in digital form to the Editor, Chez Ciechanowicz at z.ciechanowicz@rhul.ac.uk.

Please supply figures and tables separately, as well as in the main document. Figures should be good resolution computer-generated graphics, clearly printed black and white line drawings, or black and white glossy photographs. All illustrations should be large enough to withstand 50% reduction and still be easily readable. Graphic files need to be at 300 dpi resolution to be publishable.

Try to incorporate all material into the text, and avoid footnotes wherever possible.

The journal prefers a minimum of scholarly apparatus.

Any measurements must be in SI units. Citations in the text should be in a 'name and year' form, and the references list at the end of the paper should be arranged alphabetically, and then further sorted chronologically.

If supplying a Latex file please provide an Adobe PDF file for our reference.

We will need a short biographical sketch of each author.

A copy of the relevant journal issue will be supplied free of charge to the main author.

Twenty five reprints can be provided on request. Further reprints (minimum order of

100) can be supplied at a reasonable cost if the request is received before the issue goes to press.
